## Building Community

### Student Learning Community

uring its second year, the Student Learning Community (SLC) program at The Albert Baker Fund (ABF) has provided a dynamic platform for students to connect, share experiences, and grow together. Led by Libby Scheiern, Ph.D., the Scholarship and Student Success Manager at ABF, the SLC meetings offer a wide variety of conversations tailored to student interests and needs. Over twenty students from various academic backgrounds (ranging from freshmen to seniors to those pursuing graduate degrees) have found a supportive community where they can explore relevant topics, such as navigating the challenges of college, application of Christian Science in everyday life, and career development.

As one student shared, **“I always felt very alone with my faith in college and did not know others were having the same thoughts as me! The SLC meetings gave me a perspective that made me feel less alone. I loved this experience!”** This sentiment underscores the program’s profound impact in fostering a sense of belonging and camaraderie among participants. Each meeting is an opportunity for students to delve into discussion, with Christian Science serving as a cornerstone theme in every conversation. Collaborating and sharing ideas on topics including preparing for finals, navigating challenges of maintaining a Christian Science practice in college, and

addressing friendship problems and disagreements, the students (with Libby’s guidance) are able to develop valuable strategies for personal and academic growth. They also explore deeper questions such as how to stay grounded in Christian Science amidst social, academic, and emotional challenges; maintain a relationship with God; and handle the belief of contagion when faced with sick peers in their dorm rooms. These engaging dialogues not only provide valuable support but also foster great spiritual and personal growth among participants.

One participating student shared, **“There isn’t a big Christian Science community where I live, and I really don’t know many others my age that know of Christian Science. So, these meetings have helped me find new ways to approach things like stress and school and also know that I am not alone, that people of my age are also reaching out to Christian Science for help.”** Through open dialogue and thoughtful exploration of shared experiences, students have found a space where they can express themselves, find support, and deepen their understanding of Christian Science in their daily lives. With plans to continue and expand the Student Learning Community program in the coming year, ABF remains committed to nurturing holistic growth and fostering an encouraging space where students can thrive academically, professionally, and spiritually.

## Odegaard Fields (Class of 2026) – Where Is He Now?

**B**ack in the spring of 2023, we shined the spotlight on Odegaard (Odie) Fields. At that time, he was a freshman at Maine Maritime Academy (MMA) and was in a program that trains students to become captains in the maritime industry. Odie described the program as very structured, with lots of rules, a hierarchy of students and staff, and a lot of leadership-based instruction.

**We thought we'd share an update on Odie's third year as he continues his studies.**

"I am a junior at Maine Maritime Academy as a marine transportation operations major and will graduate in 2026. I am studying to sail on the ocean as a deck officer on a commercial vessel. Unaffiliated with the Navy or Coast Guard, I will drive cargo vessels around the globe. I enjoy studying and the material I am learning, and subsequently just was honored with a prestigious academic award. The single recipient is voted by the entire faculty in the student's major, based on academic achievement and a love of learning.

"Part of my education includes time at sea, so this past summer I spent 90 days on a liquid cargo vessel transporting gasoline and diesel from the Mississippi River to both of Florida's coasts. The experience was a hands-on, internship-style experience that was incredibly enriching in both my studies and as a leader.

"Christian Science is a part of my daily life and is one of the things I am most grateful for. I have spent two years away from my church community, as my college is in rural Maine. Last summer I was able to spend two refreshing weeks away at Camps Newfound and Owatonna, which helped reinvigorate my daily practice. The love I feel in church and at camp grounds me for the times I am not physically able to attend Sunday School.

"My life is very busy, but the time I take to listen to the [Bible] Lesson or read a Psalm makes my whole experience slow down, giving me all the time in the world to rejoice in the good. I am very grateful for The Albert Baker Fund for their generosity and how much they have been a part of this enriching experience."

Joy loves to travel, showing that same openness to the world, and especially its more exotic locations. She can now report that she has been to all 50 US states as well as 40 countries!

She felt God’s presence. After making her way the rest of the way down the incline with a little help, she contacted a Christian Science practitioner for prayerful support that night.
